# Pattishall Parish Plan 2 Update

# Introduction

The Pattishall Parish Plan 2 (PP2) update questionnaire, which was completed in November 2013, provided a great deal of additional information. It highlighted the hopes and aspirations of the residents and informed the future requirements and needs of the Parish.



A number of the ideas and suggestions have already come to fruition, others are on-going projects with more in the planning stage.

# Village Confines

There was an overwhelming response to keep the village confines.

The original confines were drawn up about 40 years ago. Space to grow within the existing confines is very restricted, offering little or no scope for development.

The government expects all Councils and Parishes to provide more housing for the growing population. Whilst much future development will be in towns such as Brackley, Towcester and Daventry, villages will also have to provide additional homes. A broad range of house types and tenure is required to meet growing demand and ensure housing for our future generations.

Pattishall Parish is unique in having three distinct settlements with their own character together with the hamlets of Cornhill, Dalscote and Fosters Booth. The number of new dwellings required in this parish by the South Northants Council (SNC) Local Plan over the next 15 years is 50-60. The Parish Council's preferred option is to share the number of houses required throughout the three villages, rather than providing for one large development. Some flexing of the village confines are necessary if we are to accommodate the 60 additional homes required by the SNC Local Plan.

The plans displayed at the Open Day show the proposed revisions and extensions to the village confines.

While reviewing the village confines the project team have also highlighted important areas of local green space that may need additional protection from development including:

• The playing fields

- The existing village greens
- Play areas at Butchers Lane and Booth Close

# Village Greens

Many respondents to the questionnaire were not aware of the village greens and most thought they were boring and uninteresting; few saw the greens as valuable green space.

However the vast majority of suggestions were positive and supportive of some level of improvement action. A scheme is moving forward to plant the greens and other areas with wild flowers. This will improve the environment and encourage wildlife.

We hope to provide these displays on Astcote and Pattishall greens and some verges in Eastcote. We will need to clear and prepare the ground over the coming months and tend to the flowers during the season. These improvements can only be achieved with a group of dedicated volunteers, as there will be a need for general up keep and on-going maintenance.

# Footpaths and Bridleways

Another suggestion is for a circular walk around the villages with stiles being replaced with kissing gates to make it easier for walkers and dogs. Some of the existing stiles are rather high and difficult to climb over. We hope to have an ongoing replacement programme designed to ensure that a kissing gate is positioned at both ends of and along a footpath route. Any changes will require the consent of the landowner and the Council's Rights of Way team.

# Achievements to date:

- **Parish Hall:** The five year re-development plan has recently been completed delivering much needed improvements to the parish hall. The next phase will be improvements to the car park, refurbishment of the main hall and a conferencing facility in the loft space.
- School Pedestrian Crossing: As with all schools, cars arrive in their droves at start and finishing times. The junction on the corner of Birds Hill and School road was becoming more and more dangerous; cars parking made it unsafe for the children to cross. The new crossing and parking restrictions have improved this situation.

- Encourage Involvement/ Engagement with wider community: The Music Festival (Picnic in the Park) and Produce Show were both a great success. The former helped by excellent weather and good organisation and the latter by bringing novice gardeners and bakers to have a go at exhibiting.
- **Faster Broadband:** BT has installed new high speed, fibre optic connectivity and is offering its Infinity service to most Parish residents.
- **SNC Local Plan:** Views expressed in the questionnaire were used to support the Parish Council response to the Local Plan consultation process, which was submitted at the end of January 2014.

# Possible Future Plans

- A Community Shop based in one of the pubs
- Coffee Shop Community Meeting Point
- Designated Bus stops and shelters
- Tackle speeding on Birds Hill, School Road, Astcote, Banbury Lane and A5.

# Next Steps

The PP2 steering group will:

- Collate and analyse all the comments received at the open day, make any necessary changes to the Parish Plan
- Respond to the next phase of the SNC Local Plan consultation
- Action plans and monitor progress

However, it is considered vital that the community should continue to be engaged in the PP2 planning process and delivery of the action plan. A further update will be published in Spring 2015.

# **Parish Constables** A new and exciting role within the Northamptonshire Police!

In my previous contribution, I provided a brief outline on what my role as the Police and Crime Commissioner entails and alluded to some of the priorities that I have set the Force in my Police and Crime Plan.

It is clear to me that one of the things that people want to see from their police force is more visible policing. On my appointment I pledged to maintain the number of frontline officers at 1,220 - indeed we are one of only four Forces in the country not to have reduced the number of frontline officers in the face of the challenging financial climate.

Therefore, in order to increase visible policing and increase resource, one of the priorities that I have set the force is an ambitious increase of the Special Constabulary to 900 officers to support the work of the 1,220 full time officers. This will result in 900 more warranted officers on our streets and would make Northamptonshire's Special Constabulary the largest outside of London, contributing vital policing to our communities.

Special Constables possess all the same powers as full time warranted police officers and are provided with full training and equipment. They work with their full time colleagues, on a voluntary, part-time basis, performing duties ranging from supporting specialist teams within the force to making arrests on the streets. This really is one of the most exciting and dynamic voluntary roles available and is a unique and fulfilling experience.

Moreover, the expansion of the Special Constabulary has brought about a range of new and exciting roles and opportunities.

One recently developed role is that of the Parish Constable. A Parish Constable is a Special Constable that is dedicated, through choice, to policing a specific area, for example Pattishall or Cold Higham and/or surrounding areas.

Parish Constables will undertake a wide variety of policing duties whilst linking in with both the local Safer Community Team and Parish Councils to ensure effective policing of the area and becoming a pillar of the community.

This is an ideal role for anybody who is interested in really making a difference where they live and I want you to be part of our journey to make Northamptonshire the Safest Place in England.





The loss of two such influential Doctors (especially in such quick succession) could have been catastrophic and it is a credit to the hard work and dedication of all of the staff within the practice (and support from the Weedon Practice) that the impact, from the patients point of view, was minimal.

And just as things might have started to get hairy and circling the wagons may have been a realistic option, riding to the rescue : cue "The William Tell Overture" .....no not the Lone Ranger and Tonto, but Dr. Georgina Robson and Dr.Andrew Morris. Both my wife and I have had cause to consult both of the new Doctors, and have found them to be approachable, with clear communication skills combined with thorough and empathetic examination techniques.

So all in all the Doctors Greenhalgh can rest easy that the practice is in safe hands and is maintaining the standards of excellence that we have come to enjoy.

# Eastcote Reminiscences

In the mid fifties we left Festival Road for Eastcote. My parents bought two small cottages on Gayton Road. They paid £750, helped by a private mortgage from the vendor, Mrs Matthews. A small business came in the 'bundle', fulfilling orders for chamois leathers.

We lived In Thatch Cottage (14 Gayton Road), with a sitting tenant in the other cottage – Auntie 'Win' as she became known, was a wonderful, knowing and supportive lady.

The house was ancient with one 'through room', a tiny snug and an even tinier kitchen. The 'through room' had a huge inglenook fireplace which had obviously been the heart of the home in times past. To one side of the fireplace was a floor-to-ceiling, deep, cupboard. The other side housed a door to access upstairs. All floors were red quarry tiles.

Upstairs there were 4 rooms; 3 bedrooms and a very large cupboard where our toys were kept. I suspect that at some stage it had been one giant space without division. There was a huge attic with stairs leading from the first floor. Fully boarded and a haven for children to play in.

The garden wasn't huge but did house an extraordinary barn. It was only feet away from the front door with a corrugated iron cover between the two. It was a two storey affair with a copper where mother did the washing, a flight of steps down to the underground floor and an inside door on the ground floor that offered an almighty fall if you went through it – there was no dividing floor at the far end of the barn!

Further along the garden path were an adjoining coal store and the outside lavatory. I loved the coal store as there were several boxes of old books I would rummage through. Some were printed in the 18<sup>th</sup> century; I still have some now – not worth anything except for imagining the history of those who had read them before.

No bathroom, although there was water in the kitchen. The sink took a pounding with Mum trying to keep everything clean. The loo was OK except for the winter when a bucket came indoors.

It wasn't as convenient as Festival Road but it was country living at its best. Mum and Dad were happiest here too, I think. They loved Grimscote but this was theirs. Dad had chickens and space to grow sweet peas, dahlias and vegetables; Mum excelled when faced with a challenge and support for those she loved. And I loved this house. There was an honesty and a sense of embrace that only old houses can impart.

Sometimes I would wake up to a bird singing on the end of my bed, if I had left the window open overnight. What better an alarm?

# Dogs Attacking Livestock

Northamptonshire Police have received reports of sheep being attacked and killed by unknown dogs in the nearby villages of Kislingbury and Nether Heyford.



Sheep are classed as Livestock under the Dogs (Protection of Livestock) Act 1953. It is an offence for a dog to worry Livestock and both the person in charge of the dog at the time and/or the owner can be prosecuted under this Act.

Worrying Livestock means to attack livestock or to chase livestock in such a way as may reasonably be expected to cause injury or suffering to the livestock. It also includes being at large in a field/enclosure where there are sheep.

This sort of incident causes distress to the owner of the livestock who may find his animals badly injured, suffering or dead. It can also cost the owner in veterinary bills and in some case effects livelihoods. Sheep especially do not cope with stress and it is known for them to die days after the incident from the shock.

In some circumstances it can also cause distress to the dog owner or the person in charge of the dog who has not gone out intending for his dog to chase livestock but due to lack of control, loss of control or disobedience such an incident occurs.

PC Chloe Radford-Gardner of the Daventry Rural Safer Community Team said "As part of our RURAL ACTION campaign - Northamptonshire Police are supporting the Farmers Guardian 'TAKE THE LEAD' campaign, encouraging members of the public to keep control of their dogs and keep them on leads where there is livestock. The campaign is by the Farmers Guardian in conjunction with the National Sheep Association"

TAKE THE LEAD signs can be displayed in prominent locations where livestock are present – Farmers wishing to find out more are encouraged to contact their local Officers

# His Own Triumph

58 year old, Towcester freelance photographer Paul Howard has, after 51 years achieved one of his goals last week. When Paul was just 5 years old, his father Geoffrey Howard who then worked as an engineer at the Plessey electronics factory in the town, bought a classic British car called a Triumph Renown Razoredge as this was to replaced their little Austin 7, which by that time was sitting redundant and



rusting on waste ground opposite their tiny rented house in Park Street Towcester.

This is where Paul and his little friends would play and imagine driving and fixing the old Austin.

Finally the old car was towed away but the shiny Triumph now stood in its place. Paul would happily clean and polish the large chrome headlamps, radiator and hubcaps. He would sit on the sweeping running boards imagining that he was on holiday somewhere near the seaside.

Unfortunately soon after his father Geoff bought the car he (Geoff) was diagnosed with cancer and spent most of the next two years in the Westminster hospital in London.

Paul's dreams of going on holiday in that lovely old classic car with is ash woodwork and green leather seats never happened because 4 days after Paul's 7th birthday in



May 1963 his father died leaving his mum a widow, who now had to support both him and his elder brother as there was hardly any support then from the government.

Because his mum (Iris) couldn't drive, the car was given away to an uncle and Paul watched it being driven off down the street never to see it again. In his 7-year-old mind he told himself that one day he would drive one himself.

The memory of that lovely car was engraved in Paul's mind and when he started his photography business in Towcester in 1983 he bought a kit car in the shape of an old Ford Model "T" which he used to take brides to church in, also he regularly took his two young children to school in it, much to their mates surprise.

The love of old cars had not gone away. Since then Paul has had a series of different old cars, which he has used for his Wedding business with great success, but the memory of being able to drive a 1950's Triumph Renown had still not yet been fulfilled.

That was up until last week. While browsing on an auction site on the internet Paul came across an advert for a gorgeous 1951 Silver Grey Triumph Renown that a wedding car hire company, down nr Gatwick was selling. Paul couldn't wait for the 6-day auction to finish, so he contacted the owner direct and asked him what price he wanted for it. The owner told him that he had a fleet of 26 vintage and veteran cars, but due to ill health he was selling some off. This one, he told Paul had featured on the BBC Antique Roadshow a few years ago and had a photo of one of the presenters standing next to the open car door.

A deal was struck and within 14 hours Paul and his wife Rebecca was sitting in their car outside two large metal gates watching them slowly automatically open leading to a gravel drive and the owners home.

There stood in front of the large house was a gleaming silver car that evoked so many different happy and sad memories from over half a century ago.

After the seller took Paul for a spin in the car, it was really a fore gone conclusion that it would be coming back home where Paul would be the proud and new owner of the car he had wanted for so long. I suppose you could call it a "Triumph".

# Don't Leave Others to Step in It!

Most of us remembered to put the clocks back last weekend – but if you are a dog owner there is just one more thing to remember as the nights draw in, don't forget to 'bag and bin' your dog's mess when you are out and about in public places.

The vast majority of dog owners are responsible and pick up after their dog, but for those that don't they are breaking the law as dog faeces pose a public health risk. If an officer from South Northamptonshire Council witnesses a dog owner not picking up they may be liable to a fixed-penalty fine of  $\pounds75$ . If the fine is not paid the owner could be fined up to  $\pounds1,000$  plus court costs.

We have also issued fixed penalties where a member of the public has witnessed a dog owner failing to pick up.

Some owners wrap the dog mess in a plastic bag, but then leave it at the side of the path. This is a littering offence and if the offender is found guilty in a Magistrates' Court the fine could increase to  $\pounds 2,500$  plus costs and they will get a criminal record.

Cllr Andrew Grant, deputy leader and portfolio holder for environmental services, said: "Thoughtless dog owners are not only spoiling other people's enjoyment of our streets and countryside but also threatening public health and giving responsible dog owners a bad name. For this irresponsible minority the message is clear – they risk being prosecuted."

The best place for wrapped dog waste is in your own black household wheeled bin, but it can also be placed in any dog waste bin provided by your town or parish council. Failing that it can be placed in any street litter bin.

Stepping in dog waste is not just unpleasant but it is also the perfect breeding ground for bacteria such as Campylobacter and Salmonella, and other forms of infection. The most damaging of these is caused by the roundworm Toxocara canis which can pose a serious health risk to any individual unlucky enough to ingest infected soil.

# One for the Road!

The old Roman road called the Watling Street (or in more modern time the A5) runs from London to Holyhead, which is around 180 miles. Not so long ago it was the trunk route out of London going north but when the M1 was built most of the traffic now use that motorway. It still supports a fair bit of traffic including cars bikes and lorries, but very rarely does it have a steam traction engine chugging along it.



On a quiet Sunday morning (5<sup>th</sup> Oct) over the brow of a slight hill a 1911 J.H. McLaren Traction engine came into view for the residents of Fosters Booth. This morning people did a double take when they saw billowing smoke and steam billowing out of the old engine as it pulled up to a halt to take in water from a fire hydrant outside the newly reopened Red Lion pub (owned by Alberto 07786737270).



The engine owned by Richard Morris (seen in pictures 07776 297507) has to fill up on route every few miles and he thought that he would stop at Fosters Booth to take on water, but he and his co-driver Andy Rimell (both from Worcestershire) spent the first half an hour digging out mud from a fire hydrant at the bottom of the small hill, only to find out that there wasn't

any pressure in the pipe so that's when they put the traction engine back into gear and chugged another 100 yards over to the Red Lion pub to get a gallon or two, of water that is!

The 1911 McLaren was built in England but then shipped over to Patagonia to be used for many years to haul Patagonian sheep wool down to the docks but in 2002

it itself was shipped back to Blighty to be totally renovated by Richard and others. The reason that it was making the journey up the A5 was that, two weeks previously it was a large steam rally in Shefford nr Old Warden Bedfordshire and they were now taking it back to what is now home all the way to Redditch, a trip of over a hundred miles.
