## Pattishall Parish Allotments

At the time of writing we are still in lockdown, who

knows where we will be when this publication is delivered. However, one aspect of current life that is thriving, is the local allotments. There have been allotments in the parish since at least the turn of the century. Although the location may have changed, one thing that remains is the enthusiasm of people to grow their own fruit and veg.

The management of the allotments was recently taken on, at the request of the parish council, by a committee of plot holders forming the association of "Pattishall Parish Allotments". The association follows the guidance as set out by the National Allotment Society; the society provides a wealth of information that may be of interest to allotment holders and gardeners alike.

There are approximately 40 plots at the parish site with tenants growing a variety of fruit veg and f owers. Allotments appeal to a wide age group. Some with great experience and expertise and other more amateur gardeners like myself. The only criteria to hold an allotment plot is an enthusiasm to give it a go. Gardening and allotmenting can be a great way to keep f t physically and mentally, plot holders experience the seasons, witness the behaviour of birds, insects and other animals and gain an understanding of the eco-system.

A recent study in the Netherlands

showed that every 10 per cent increase in exposure to green space translated into an improvement in health equivalent to being f ve years younger, with similar benef ts found by studies in Canada and Japan. A study of the health and wellbeing benef ts of allotment gardening in 2015 found that overall one single session of allotment gardening can improve both self-esteem and mood, irrespective of how long participants spend on the allotment. Furthermore, allotment gardeners have a better level of self-esteem and mood and a reduced level of abnormal psychological functioning than non-gardeners. Well if this is true then I will certainly continue gardening come rain or shine.

Another source of information for gardeners is the RHS Facebook page which contains a link to the RHS Campaign for School Gardening. #### Pattishall Picnic in the Park Music Festival – returns 2021

Well, this is not the way we, on the Picnic team, expected this summer to turn out. This year's Picnic in the Park is cancelled, as you will know if you follow us on facebook or we have contacted you by email. No point fretting about it. All we can do is go with it, like so many other aspects of life this year. But we look forward to returning next year, as big and bold as ever, on Saturday 10 July 2021!

When we started in 2014 a local company, Unusual Rigging of Bugbrooke, gave us a huge helping hand by donating a professional stage for us to use. Their founder and owner, Alan Jacobi, continued to do this for our frst four years. Very sadly Alan died of cancer this year on 13 April, aged 67.

Alan transformed the entertainment industry, bringing a spectacular new dimension to technical performance, whether on stage or in stadiums. AJ, as he was known, revolutionised the way theatre staging and effects work. If you have been to the theatre in London you may have seen the chandelier that plummets over the audience in *Phantom of the Opera*, the descending helicopter in *Miss Saigon*, the moving scenery in *Les Misérables*, the f ight of *Mary Poppins* – all made possible by AJ's ingenuity.

However, AJ did not just work his magic in theatre staging, but was also involved in the Royal Tournament for 27 years (I went every year when I lived in London), He worked on the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary VE and VJ day celebrations, the 2002 Golden Jubilee celebrations, 2012 Olympics, to mention just a few of the prestigious events that benef tted from

AJ's hard work, innovation and creativity. He always found a way. Not bad for a self taught engineer and rigger, who would admit that the only exam he ever passed was his driving test!

Thank you AJ, for the support you gave us at Pattishall Picnic in the Park. We appreciate it. RIP.

What a year 2020 has been: rains, lockdown, near-drought, and now what looks like more typical June weather. VE Day commemorations became front garden socially-distanced tea parties, home-schooled children perfected their baking skills, and many of us discovered new walks around our beautiful villages. #### Interview with Bill McColl (92) Fosters Booth

Q. Bill, thanks for doing this interview for Around Pattishall. How long have you lived in Fosters Booth?

- A. I've lived here now for 38 years.
- **Q.** What do you remember of V.E. Day?
- **A.** Very little, actually. I was away at school at Rugby and although I assume there must have been announcements or celebrations, neither I nor a contemporary I spoke to remember anything.
- **Q.** Where were your parents living at the time?
- **A.** At St Johns School, Tiff eld Turn. This was a Home Off ce Approved school for delinquents and boys needing care, where Dad was Headmaster and Mother was Matron.
- Q. Where were you on V.J. Day?
- **A.** I was at home then, as it was during school holidays. I remember f ying two large kites (were they called Wombats?)

across the Northampton - Towcester road with a cord between them on which I tied some f ags including the Union Jack. I subsequently lost one out to sea!

- **Q.** What brought about your interest in kites?
- **A.** My Godfather, who was a school master at Wellingborough, was very eccentric and knew a lot about manlifting kites from his time in the R.F.C. during the 1914-18 war. He built one and tied it to his car and got the kite f ying. Very shortly the kite began to lift the car off the ground and he had to cut the rope very quickly. The kite crashed!
- Q. What was the food like at school?
- A. Awful! The boys at Tiff eld ate much better. For example, my mother and I picked a laundry basket full of mushrooms for them. I was lucky because food was good at home. Mother kept hens fed on scraps and gleanings and there was plenty of fruit.
- Q. Did you see any bombs falling?
  A. No, but an RAF bomber crashed at Showsley just down the road to Towcester and I found a piece of it in a f eld. My Dad was at Blisworth Station when it was machine gunned by a German plane.

## Farming Through Covid 19 Nita Pearson - Grimscote



On the surface little has changed in farming life. The lambing season progressed

relentlessly, a time when everyone works as a team. We had a good crop of lambs without too many problems with

the lambs now skipping with their mothers in the f elds.

But wait! Due to the lock-down we have not had the children who have special educational needs to visit during lambing. We have had groups of children coming to the farm for the last f fteen years. Many of these children have never been to a farm and although they may be nervous to begin with they begin to relax when with the lambs. If they are lucky they may be able to bottle feed any small lambs. They are then taken to see the cows and maybe see tractors and how big they are, then f nally a cuddle with Bob our very laidback spaniel. All f nished off with snacks in the kitchen. How we have missed the laughter of small children.

Work now changes gear to drill the crops that were not planted in the Autumn due to the very wet weather: a wet Spring, a very cold spell but we carry on with typical British stoicism!

At long last the workload eases but no socialising as we are all asked to play our part in controlling the spread of the virus. Farming is often a solitary occupation with long hours working alone but not having any social interaction can have serious mental health issues. These may be compounded by f nancial implications especially when farm prices are controlled by so few people. Dairy farms have been hit hard and many have had to throw milk away, though thankfully no dairy farms in this area.

There is a plus side - we can hear the beautiful bird song, clear skies, less traff c, fewer aeroplanes overhead and time to enjoy the changing scenes of our beautiful countryside. So bear a thought for those who live in towns and cities when we return to normality with fresh eyes and a humility for the countryside around us.

#### Children's outlook on Lockdown

Lockdown has had a huge impact on everyone in the country; however we rarely see how it has affected children. During the



lockdown, children have been completely isolated from other people, with their parents being urged not to take their children when they run errands such as going shopping. We sent out an online survey to 30 teens in the area and we received 23 responses (summarised at the bottom of the page).

From this data, we learned that teens tended to be enjoying the lockdown, enjoying the freedom to learn new skills, work individually and spend more time with their family members. However, many teens are also missing aspects of normal life, yearning to have some of the more regular activities back in their life such as team sports, socialising and in some cases even school.

Many teens have come up with ways to keep themselves occupied throughout lockdown, with many taking up new hobbies including baking, gardening and even trying to learn new languages. Additionally, many have been spending more time doing exercise, enjoying cycling, walking and HIIT workouts.

Furthermore, the survey indicated that the lockdown may have a long term affect on teens, with many believing that it will negatively affect their grades and possibly decrease their prospects for careers, along with some feeling that the lockdown has negatively affected their mental health. These results correspond with similar surveys carried out by large organisations such as Unicef and Save

the Children, which found that ¼ of children in lockdown are now dealing with anxiety with 'many at risk of lasting psychological distress, including depression'. They also wrote that parents need to be aware these problems are lasting and so will continue even after lockdown.

Now that lockdown is beginning to ease, with schools soon to reopen partially and the ability to meet up with a friend, let us hope that we can return and establish a new form of normality.

#### Foodbank Donations

An enormous "thank you" to everyone in our villages who has been supporting the Towcester Foodbank since lockdown began. In April 153kg of food was donated, and in May this rose to 310kg which has helped result in the foodbank having a plentiful supply to meet the needs of local people facing f nancial hard times.

#### What does the Foodbank do?

I visited the Foodbank's website <a href="https://towcester.foodbank.org.uk/">https://towcester.foodbank.org.uk/</a> to find out more about its work. The Towcester Foodbank was founded by local people and community groups, and is part of a nationwide network supported by The Trussell Trust, working to combat poverty and hunger locally and across the UK. It is staffed by volunteers and stocked with food donated by members of the public and local organisations.

How do people access the foodbank? People who need to access the foodbank because they cannot afford to buy food should contact their referral agency if they've used the foodbank before, or SNC Money Advice on 01327 322107, to be issued with an e-voucher code. They should then ring the foodbank, give the code, and conf rm details. Their food bags will be delivered within 2 working days. Schools, health / medical centres and some clergy are also able to issue youchers.

#### So, what's in a food parcel?

These contain suff cient nutrition for at least three days of meals for individuals or families. They can be adapted to meet dietary needs, such as gluten free, halal or vegetarian. A typical parcel might include:

Breakfast cereals

Soup

Pasta

Rice

Is there really need in our area?

Yes! UK charities, including the British Red Cross, Salvation Army and Trussell Trust have all noted that food poverty has increased during the coronavirus pandemic as families and individuals who were "just about managing" have lost jobs, livelihoods and incomes. An article in the Guardian on 15 May said that foodbanks had seen a record 81% increase in demand for food parcels in recent weeks - including a 122% increase in children relying on food aid. Locally, analysis comparing April and May 2019 with the same period this year shows a 61% increase in number vouchers fulf lled, reaching 29% more people.

Whether you are a one-off donor or a regular supporter, your generous contributions to the Foodbank are making a real difference to people in need in our local area – thank you so much for your continued support.

Food must be non-perishable (tinned, dried or powdered), in-date and unopened.

In addition to the items already listed, the Foodbank will accept baby food, but NOT infant formula.

It will also accept donations of nappies and baby wipes, soap, toiletries and pet food.

The Foodbank isn't taking donations of clothing or plastic bags, so please hold on to these for when the charity shops are able to reopen!

To donate money to the Towcester Foodbank please contact Foodbank trustee, Christine Russell, on 830012, who will advise how to do this.

## Wartime Memories Blanche Smith

Blanche Smith moved to Pattishall ten years ago from Kent. Here is her account of life during the war and her memories of VE Day in 1945:

The war started in September 1939, just before I was 9. We lived very close to Chelsf eld Station at 1 Station Cottages.

Chelsf eld was about 15 miles south east of London in Kent. The railway line was a strategic route to get tanks and equipment to Dover and at Chelsf eld there was an electricity substation making the area a prime target for German bombers.

My school was a mile away in Chelsf eld village and I would often miss school if there was an air raid. At the beginning of the war they were bombing Biggin Hill which was not that far away. Early in the war we could watch 'dog f ghts' from the back door of our house. The barrage balloons put up to protect London from air raids made the German planes come

further our way and they would often drop their bombs anywhere in the area. Fort Halstead (an ammunition development centre) was another target and was just a couple of miles away. Anti aircraft guns (ACK-ACK guns) would be f red from the area and we could hear them and feel the vibration when we were in the

feel the vibration when we were in the air raid shelter.

When the f rst V1 (doodle bug) came over my Mum and a neighbour were looking up and wondered what it was. Mum said 'I don't know what it is but its back side is alight!' You could hear the engine stop and then the bomb would just fall from the sky and there was a thud as it hit the ground.

My Gran and her younger sons used to walk to their nearest station every night to get the train to Chislehurst Caves which was like an underground town used as an air raid shelter. When the train got to Chelsf eld she would shout across to me and my Mum 'Why don't you come with us? You'll stay there and get killed!' We never went. Towards the end of the war she was so frightened that she just stayed at the caves and didn't come home.

One Sunday lunch time I remember that a bomb landed within 50 feet of our house but didn't explode. We had to be evacuated while it was defused. We asked the soldiers to look after the chicken while we were away. They did. They fed them all the cabbages we were growing. My Uncle Scooter (real name Henry) watched the army detonate the bomb from a safe distance on the bridge over the railway line with a bucket on his head for protection! The explosion blew all the carrots out of the ground. We evacuated ourselves to Gran's a few miles away and that night a landmine landed nearby and exploded.

Our air raid shelter was meant to be for us and the house next door. Mr Morgan, who lived next door, was rather old and would have had trouble getting in and out of the shelter so he used to go to the local pub at the top of the road each night and sleep in the cellar where a bed was provided.

VE Day 8th May, 1945 Charlie Pye and Percy Ball (honestly, that was their names) from the Youth Club called round and said 'Are you coming with us tomorrow?' A dozen of us got the train to London Bridge, crossed the Thames over London Bridge and walked down The Strand and somebody had got a dustbin lid which they banged as we sang 'McNamara's Band'. We were swept along in the crowd up to Buckingham Palace. I remember climbing up on one of the lions by the Victoria Monument and everyone shouting 'We want the King'. The Royal Family came out onto the balcony of Buckingham Palace several times, and Churchill joined them. We mingled with the crowd during the day and got the train home from Charing Cross about 10.30pm arriving home before midnight.

There was great relief 'it was all over'.

#### Pattishall Primary School

2020 certainly has brought our school community more than we bargained for. We began back in January full of high hopes for the Spring and Summer Terms ahead.

In February, following extensive rehearsals, our school choir sang with over 8,000 other children in the Young Voices concert at the London O2 Arena. It was an amazing experience, which would not have been possible without countless lunchtimes sacrif ced by the choir to rehearse and the dedication of Mr May, Mrs Onley and Mrs Coventry. Thanks to our Parish Council who helped to fund the coach to get us there. The PC have also, more recently, paid for a new f agpole after ours collapsed

during the lockdown! We are very grateful to the committee for their ongoing support of the school and the next generation of parishioners.

Two days later, our Year 3s performed at the Northampton Boy's School in 'Junction 20'. Their performance was

truly fearless as they danced, cartwheeled and f ipped over the stage in front of a packed house of secondary school pupils and their parents. Special thanks goes to Miss Dalton for organising the experience and to Jacob – an ex-Pattishall pupil and student at the Boy's School, who came in weekly to teach the children their routines.

Towards the end of February, we had unbridled success at the School Games,

where out of 100 schools we gained a podium place in 'New Age Curling'. One of the team – William – stepped in with just 20 minutes practice!

On 28th February, our amazing FoPs Team came together to run the annual Pancake Flip, which as ever was a fipping success! Little did we know that this would be our last FoPs event of the year.

On 5th March we celebrated World Book Day, with all the children and staff coming dressed as a word. We had: 'angelic', 'exotic', 'enveloped', 'environmental', 'courageous', 'aff uent', 'sophisticated', 'angry', 'cosy', 'anomalous', 'theatrical', 'greedy' and 'yellow'. Much fun was had by all at the cosy story time at the end of the day too.

Then, at 3.15pm on Friday 20th March, after 48 hours' notice, we closed our

doors indef nitely. It was an immensely unsettling time for everyone. Our teaching team went into overdrive, reinventing education from a virtual platform and the whole community pulled together to establish the 'new normal'.

Whilst we have been apart, we have come closer together as a school community. We raised several hundred pounds for the Brain Tumour Charity on 'Wear a Hat Day'. Our Reception class also raised close to £3000 for the Hope Centre by having a 'Big Sleep In', where they were sponsored to sleep somewhere uncomfortable to help remind us all of those who have no f xed abode. We also enjoyed sharing our

photos of us all dressed in blue to

support the NHS and our VE Day tea parties.

On 10<sup>th</sup> May, the PM Boris Johnson announced that we are to begin our phased return to school. So, on 2nd June 2020, we welcome back our Reception and Year 1 classes and our Year 6 class on 3rd June. We will also be welcoming back children of critical workers, who are mostly in Year 4.

And whilst school will be a little different, it isn't scary. We have put in place robust safety measures and systems to help mitigate the ultimate risk; including an anti-microbial fogging courtesy of HPS Services. Our amazing teachers and support team are all very much looking forward to seeing some life breathed back into the building – the way it should be. And as the infection rate decreases, we hope to welcome more and more children over the coming months. We know that things will be a little different for a while yet, but we are optimistic.

I would like to take this opportunity to say the most enormous thank you to my team for their dedication and commitment to the children throughout this uncertain time. I'd also like to thank all of the parents for their support and good humour – even though things have been really tough at times, I have never felt so proud to be part of the Pattishall family. But the biggest thanks goes to the children of Pattishall CE Primary School, who have shown immense resilience, determination and grit as they have had to give up socialising with their friends as well as the routine that going to school brings.

I have missed you all very much – I can't wait to see you again – now is the time to begin to look ahead.

#### Memories of a small village in rural Buckinghamshire

A manor house, church, a few farms and several cottages. Shire horses doing the work, we children riding astride them back to the stable or following the furrow behind the plough. The farmer's wife bringing tea to the men in her pony and trap, wildf owers everywhere.

This all changed as an aerodrome was built right up to the edge of the village cutting it off from the school. A new road was built, the workmen helping us on our way carrying our gas masks and lunch bags aged 5, a journey of 2 miles.

The hanger and bomb depot were a small f eld away from our home, it was scary. With damaged planes landing it was also rather exciting. Lorries and air people going from the station – we sold them violets picked from the hedgerows. Evacuees came to stay.

The village was never the same again. The manor house was turned into f ats, Jewish evacuees came to stay to recover from the ordeal of the concentration camps. The walled garden and croquet lawn become all overgrown. Not the place I remember as a small child with all the staff, singing carols in the big hall at Christmas and having presents in the Butler's pantry.

Buildings used by the RAF were turned into homes for Displaced Persons, many who went on to marry local girls.

The aerodrome went back to farmland, it was almost as if it had never been there.



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## Pattishall Parish Council Chairman's 2019-20 Report

The past twelve months have certainly been a time of change and one of ref ection. The Coronavirus pandemic provided challenging times for young and old alike. Our parish school closed along with others nationwide from March 23rd and remain closed as I write this at the beginning of May. The Parish Council quickly swung into action, leaf eting the parish and posting notes on social media websites asking for volunteers to help with shopping, collection of prescriptions, dog walking or connecting with those who may find themselves lonely in the lockdown. Residents were urged to contact the Parish Clerk should they require assistance. Ann Addison (Parish Clerk) co-ordinated this operation and many thanks go to Ann for all her dedication in helping our Parish at this most diff cult of times and to all those volunteers.

I do believe that many have discovered how fortunate we are to live in such a rural location with over thirty designated footpaths in the parish covering some thirteen miles. Many residents have been out and about, especially as we have been experiencing such warm and dry weather during April and the gardens are looking magnif cent as people have more time to dedicate to them. I hear that there are many growing fruit and vegetables for the f rst time and the Parish Allotments are looking quite splendid. It is too early to conf rm whether this year's Produce Show will go ahead but surely it will be a bumper year of entries.

Although challenging it is heart-warming to see our community spirit is alive and well with residents enjoying a socially

distanced chat as they take their daily exercise. It has become a common site to see many families out walking, plus dog. Throughout the year there are those who help in many different ways and our thanks go to Linda Hemming who co-ordinates Neighbourhood Watch and often attends parish meetings to keep us updated, Michael Fleck for his continued management of the Garden of Remembrance and Bob Illingworth for managing the parish website.

Keeping our parish neat and tidy is always a challenge and both Laura Dark and John Stretton have helped by either attending to the planters on School Road or keeping the foliage at bay along the Suttons Walk footpath. Steve Parkinson continues to collect litter from Hodge Close to the A5 on a regular basis and this year saw over thirty volunteers turn out for the Annual Litter Pick in early March.

Thanks also to Ann Atkins for her tenacious efforts in keeping the number 87 bus service going. It really looked as if this vital artery for many was to be lost as the County looked to reduce its expenditure. Pattishall, along with other parishes banded together and at an agreeable extra cost to our budget we were able to support the bus service but the more people who use it the less the cost to the parish. Iris Illingworth is a stalwart of the parish and is deserving of thanks for all she does for the council and community, as too is Andy Stewart the editor of Around Pattishall. In conclusion the Parish Council would like to thank all those who run clubs and organisations that enrich the life of residents of all ages.

Sadly, the zip wire became unsafe to use and after continued efforts to get the f rm that installed the apparatus to make good the metal poles' foundations the council concluded that we would have to

bear the brunt of the cost. The zip wire is now mended but playgrounds remain closed whilst governmental directives remain operational. Members of the Council have been in communication with South Northants Council about obtaining a grant for play equipment for the Booth Close play area. We are hopeful to have good news about this project in due course.

Parking throughout the parish can be problematic, none more so than along School Road at school drop off and pick up times. The verge was not only an unsightly mud bath but was being badly eroded. Wooden stakes known as Dragon's Teeth were installed and the problem appears to have been rectif ed.

After much deliberation it was with great sadness that Eastcote Chapel closed just before Christmas. For many years the congregation had been dwindling and as the years went by the fabric of the building started to deteriorate to a point that a considerable investment was required to keep the building structurally sound. The f nal service was particularly well attended with residents able to join one another in prayer and thanksgiving for the part the chapel had played in the life of the parish.

After thirty-three years Roger Clarke is retiring from the Parish Council. Roger has held off ces as Vice Chairman and Chairman as well as serving for many vears on the South Northants Council. His commitment to public service has been ongoing for many years and as a council we have beneftted hugely from his knowledge and experience. Under normal circumstances we would be having our annual AGM in May with the election of councillors and off cers. Under the 'Sunset Clause' AGM's may be deferred for a year and therefore a new date will be announced further down the line.

May I f nally take the opportunity to thank my fellow councillors for their efforts and support throughout the year and to all I wish you well and hope that next year will not be as challenging as the last one.

#### Cold Higham Parish Council

The Parish Council Meeting, and the Annual Parish Meeting (APM), scheduled for 19<sup>th</sup> March 2020, were both cancelled because of the Covid-19 pandemic. The Chairman's Report, which should have been delivered to the APM, is included with this report. It covers the previous 12 months' activities up to the time of the lockdown, the last

activity being the parish litter pick in the pouring rain on 15<sup>th</sup> March. Some of the plucky pickers can be seen in the photo.



Since the lockdown began, the Council have endeavoured to keep parish residents up to date with local activities by means of Nextdoor social media, and the parish web site. Two circulars were delivered to every parish household: the first offering advice and seeking volunteer helpers; the second offering support from the local emergency food larder for those most in need. Over a dozen people volunteered to support others within the parish, and although there has, mercifully, been little call for them so far, the PC are most grateful to them for their offers of help.

Despite the lockdown, work has continued apace on both the A5 refurbishment, and on the deployment of

high-speed broadband cabling by Gigaclear within the parish and Pattishall. Both activities have been the subjects of discussion on our local Nextdoor, enabling those who need the information to be kept up to date. Thank you to all contributors.

The planned VE75 celebrations for 8<sup>th</sup> May were, of course, cancelled, sad to say. But the residents of Church Lane did manage to hold a very successful socially-distanced street party – well done to them (see separate report).

Another casualty of the crisis has been the planned elections for the parish council. These will now take place in May 2021.

History was made on 21st May when the PC held its f rst 'virtual' meeting using the Zoom app. Preparations had been made beforehand, and the meeting went very well, with all appropriate business being conducted remotely. The Government had previously passed the necessary legislation allowing such meetings to take place. The PC off cers were re-elected at the meeting; the list of all members can be seen on the web site. Plans are in hand to continue these online meetings for the foreseeable future. Agendas and minutes will appear on the web site as per normal, and members of the public are welcome to 'attend'.

The annual audit of the parish accounts has also taken place 'remotely'. The auditor commented that she was able to 'access a well ordered and detailed set of accounts and records' and was 'able to answer 'yes' to all relevant questions and has signed the Return as required'. Councillors are very grateful to the Clerk for her hard work in producing the accounts and audit papers under trying circumstances. The accounts and audit reports will be put on the web site after the next parish council meeting in June.

#### Cold Higham APM 19<sup>th</sup> March 2020 Chairman's Report

I am pleased to present my third report to the Annual Parish Meeting (APM).

In contrast to last year, I am delighted to report that we have had no turnover in personnel this year. Furthermore, with the delayed Parish Council elections fast approaching in May, it is great news that all councillors have agreed to offer themselves for re-election. I would like to thank them all very sincerely for their support and work over the year. Our new clerk, Gillian Greaves, has settled in extremely well, and we all thank her, most particularly, for her help and wise guidance.

With the help of grants from South Northants Council we started the replacement of our street lights, changing to environmentally-friendlier LEDs. The ten lights in Grimscote and along Banbury Lane were all converted on 30<sup>th</sup> September. There has been a delay for a number of reasons in replacing the remaining f ve, but some, at least, should be completed soon. The f rst quarterly electricity bill after the new lights had been f tted showed a reduction from £283 to £154 – almost

half. The Council is most grateful to South Northants Council for the New Homes Bonus Grant money which has enabled these lights to be f tted without cost to Cold Higham's precept.

The Council organised the usual Remembrance Sunday commemoration on 10<sup>th</sup> November followed by drinks and snacks in the Parish Hall. Both were well attended, and the Council is most grateful to Cllr Everest Hayes for the supplies courtesy of J Sainsburys.

During the year Cllr Forster has undertaken an overhaul of the cemetery documentation and records, which is still ongoing. The Council is most grateful to him for this labour of love.

The major refurbishment work on the A5 between Fosters Booth and Towcester, begun during the year, has affected travel in the parish. The web site has been temporarily adjusted to include regular updates on this work received from the Highways England contractor. This information has been largely responsible for a vast increase in page viewings on the web site - from 16 per day in February 2019 to 98 per day in February 2020.

Fibre broadband cables are about to start being laid in and around the parish by Gigaclear. This will bring ultrafast broadband to the parish. Meanwhile there will be additional roadworks disruption for a few months as the roads and pavements are dug up to insert the cables.

There are two grass cutting contracts
The Churchyard, Cemetery and the road
verges in Cold Higham and Grimscote.
This remains our most expensive
service, though the cost has not been
raised for next year. The Council is very
grateful to Keith Hurford for organising
these contracts.

The Churchyard. Last season the specif cation changed to include more regular cutting and collecting of the trimmings in the cemetery, a one metre strip along all footpaths in the churchyard and around the war memorial. This has improved the appearance of these areas. Also included is annual cutting of the hedge along the cemetery and No1 Church Lane boundary.

Road verges. This will be the third season the verges have been strimmed, and many parishioners have commented that it has improved the overall appearance and given a more cared for look to the villages.

Once again we have suffered from damage to road signs within the parish. Ultimately we as a parish will have to pay for the repairs.
