Salvation for Your Old Clothes

The Salvation Army Clothing bin at Pattishall Parish Hall is well utilised by many residents. The bin is emptied regularly and the clothing is sorted at the Salvation Army warehouse in Kettering before being sold in their charity shops.

The charity now has a new infrared scanner which it hopes will turn unwearable donations into new clothes. The government-funded scanner detects the type and colour of garments that are deemed too scruffy or damaged to sell and sorts them into wool, cotton, polyester or viscose. They are then sent to a mill in Huddersfield to be spun into yarn balls and used to make new jumpers, cardigans and socks.

This is a pilot scheme and the Salvation Army hopes to become the UK's first 'fibre farm' for donated clothing.

A 2022 Resume and Looking towards 2023

A busy 2022 for our wonderful Parish Hall and the Committee would like to thank local residents for their continued amazing support throughout the year.

Following a successful year of events and fundraising in 2021, we hosted a "Soup and Rolls" morning at the hall on Saturday 12 March, which was well supported in spite of the cool temperatures, raising a total of £119. This event was followed by a St George's Day Quiz (with fish and chip supper) on 23 April, led by our resident "Quizmaster", Karl Lange. This event was again well received. and great fun for all those who attended. raising a further £143 for the Hall.

With support from Sainsbury's Community Fund and the National Lottery, Cold Higham Parish Hall Committee, together with Cold Higham Parish Council and members of the local community, were able to organise a full weekend of events to mark the Platinum Jubilee of the late Queen Elizabeth II on Saturday 4 and Sunday 5 June. From fireworks and a cinema evening on Saturday 4 June, to a "Jubilee Tea Party" on Sunday 5 June, these events saw a huge amount of planning and organisation on the part of those involved. They were however immensely well supported, and enjoyed, by residents who attended and were fitting tribute to the long reign of our late Queen.

2022 also marked the 150th anniversary of the construction of Cold Higham Parish Hall and as such, the Committee took the opportunity of combining the Jubilee celebrations with those to mark this great milestone. An exhibition of memorabilia pertaining to Cold Higham Parish, and the Hall, was constructed, and available for residents to view over the Jubilee weekend.

The Autumn Term has been busy and jam packed with lots of learning! That 'buzz' of learning is in every room. I am so pleased with the progress that the children are making! We have particularly enjoyed inviting families into school to have a look around and feel that buzz! Our Year 6 tour guides did an amazing job on our open days and our Year 4 children have been delighted to be able to meet their buddies from Little Dragons Day Nursery.

We recognised Anti-bullying Week by wearing odd socks and discussing bullying in our collective worships and PSHE lessons.



Reception have been using their stem sentences in Maths to develop their mathematical language of fewer and more. They enjoyed a Diwali dance workshop, which they really threw themselves into! They have also made some wonderful firework pictures as part of their topic on light.

In Year 1, they have been discussing different habitats and the sorts of animals they might find in the school grounds. They have used their stem sentences for addition to help them solve word problems in maths and then used colourful semantics to help them build sentences for their safari guides. They also completed a practical postassessment in maths, using part/part/whole models to partition numbers. The progression into Year 2 was very clear as they are using partitioning numbers to bridge ten in addition. For example, 25 + 7 =25 + (5+2). They have also written their Owl Who Was Afraid of the Dark stories and should be feeling very proud of themselves!

Year 3/4 have built excellent teamwork, gross motor skills and balance with Mr White.



They have routinely had the Chromebooks out to code, so that a character could find his way out of the maze. They also prepared and shared the most beautiful Remembrance service in Holy Cross on Friday 11th November.

Year 5 have been practising their

handwriting, whilst learning cool maths facts! Forty is the only number to have its letters in alphabetical order! Who knew?! They have also learnt about Verdi's 'Dies Ire' in Music identifying the instruments and whether they enjoyed it or not.

In Years 5 and 6 they have been continuing their artwork on making paper sculptures of birds; as well as learning about the Shang Dynasty and where it falls on a timeline.

We are so proud of our school choir who sang with lots of other children from across Northamptonshire at Peterborough Cathedral on 16th November. They performed a Joseph medley and did us all proud!

Mystery Murder in Cold Higham

Sometime around 1320, Joan, the wife of John of Grimscote, sent Iseult Savere as a messenger to John fitz John, who lived in Pattishall, to ask him to go to Grimscote to talk to her. There must have been some impelling reason why he needed to speak to her, as we are told that he came at once.


> "fitz John" in medieval times meant "son of John". By the fourteenth century. surnames were often inherited, so it is possible that John fitz John's father was not called John and that fitz John was used as a surname. We do know at that time there was a Knight called "Sir John of

Pattishall" , his monument is in the church at Grimscote. Perhaps John fitz John was one of his servants.

Cold Higham Church is worth a visit. The tomb of Sir John de Pattishall (1291-1346) lies in a side chapel. You will also find other medieval features in the church, such as the Leper's window (which looks a little like a small door from Alice in Wonderland).



The route John fitz John must have taken from Pattishall to Grimscote would have taken him through Cold Higham. Unusually for that time, the three villages were guite close together. Add to that the now deserted village of Potcote which is just down the road from Cold Higham and you have a neat little medieval community, sharing certain facilities such as churches, manors and the communal oven.



to heat an area hot enough for these tasks, although these were sometimes attached to houses.

houses. a

You can clearly see the holes in the side of the building and in the thatch to allow smoke to escape. Air would enter the building lower down (e.g. through the doors) to draw the fires.

Well. John reached Grimscote and went to find Joan at her house. Joan and John spoke for a little time, walking through the village as they spoke. She walked with him as far as "Mayneswell" then he continued to walk towards Cold Higham to return to Pattishall.

Todav. Grimscote is a quiet little village with many stone and thatched cottages.



As John passed the communal oven in Cold Higham, he was set upon by a band of men who bundled him into the oven and pushed him into the fire, where he was "burned to ashes".

Looking into the top of the fire hole inside the Oven building at Cosmeston. it is possible to see how a man's body could fit into the fire.

The case was taken to the General Evre of 1329¹ by the jurors of Towcester. Cold Higham, Pattishall and Grimscote were all in the Hundred of Towcester, and it is likely that the case had already been heard by the court of the Hundred. The jurors named a number of people who they believed were involved: Joan, wife of John of Grymescote (Grimscote), Stephen le Chaundeler, Malcolm of Potcote, Simon of Potcote, Brother Robert of Maydenford (Maidford) of the order of the Carmelites² and John le Warde of Maydeneford. The jurors alleged that Joan had plotted the death of John fitz John and prepared the oven in the house of Stephen le Chaundeler³. They alleged that she had employed Malcolm of Potcote, Simon of Potcote. Brother Robert of Maydenford and John le Warde of Maydenford to seize John fitz John and place him in the oven. Since the event, Joan had left the area and was living in Warwickshire.33

Geoffrey le Scrope, a leading Lawyer and friend of the King, was presiding over the Eyre. He ordered that the sheriff of Northamptonshire should arrest Malcolm and

¹ This was the General Eyre of Northampton. There had been no General Evres since the end of the thirteenth century and this Evre was a revival of an old institution, which the government was trying to re-establish.

² Carmelites were a mendicant order who had given themselves to a life of poverty and travelling. A Carmelite order was established in Northampton during the thirteenth century.

³ A chandler made candles and soap in medieval times. Stephen would have needed an oven for extracting the tallow from animal carcasses. This would have created an obnoxious smell, so it is likely that his oven was on the edge of the village.

the others and that the Sheriff of Warwickshire should arrest Joan. The trial was arranged for 9th February 1330.

When 9th February eventually arrived, it was only Joan who appeared in the dock. Brother Robert, the Carmelite monk, could not be found and the others had all died in the period between the crime being committed and the trial. This suggests that the crime had been committed some years earlier. Joan pleaded Not Guilty and "put herself on the country", that is to say asked for a jury to consider her case. The account states that the "inquest" 4 appeared and stated that she had plotted the crime. The iurv found that Joan was guilty of being a "principal" even though she did not physically commit the murder, and was therefore condemned to be hanged. She had no chattels as she was a feme covert (married woman). Brother Robert was suspected of the crime and was outlawed. We are told that he had no chattels⁵ and was not in tithing as he was a cleric.

The scribe wrote that afterwards, Geoffrey le Scrope "rehearsed" the case with Richard Aldborough, another justice at the Eyre. Aldborough remarked that if one engages another to kill a man, he will be considered a principal upon conviction. We are told that "No one contradicted this". This is, perhaps, an example of how our modern laws were being developed in the middle ages.

⁴ The "inquest" suggests that there would have been an investigation into the death of John fitz John. All unexplained and unnatural deaths had to be reported to the coroner and this would have sparked an enquiry. Unfortunately, records do not tell us the detail of what evidence there was that Joan plotted the murder.

⁵ Chattels (belongings) would have been confiscated if someone was found quilty. Joan. as a married woman, had no chattels as they belonged to her husband. Brother Robert's chattels belonged to the Church.

Councillor News

Sarah Toll has had to step down as a parish councillor due to increased family & work commitments. The council thank Sarah for her input, especially in setting up the parish council Facebook page. We are now looking to co-opt another councillor to fill the vacancy and those interested should please contact the clerk, Ann Addison, for details.

Street Lighting

The council is in the process of replacing the existing lanterns with more energy efficient LED ones. The council are also investigating the installation of part night cells on various lights throughout the parish but not at iunctions or crossroads. The National Grid calculate that where a part night cell, set to switch off at midnight and come on again at 5am, is installed on an 18watt LED lantern. there would be approximately a 44% reduction in the energy the lantern burns annually. As the council has to set a precept to cover the costs of running the parish, they are looking at trying to reduce costs in order not to have a huge hike over the one set for this year. The council would like to hear the views of parishioners regarding the installation of part night cells from 1am till 5am. Please contact the parish clerk or a councillor with your thoughts and/or suggestions.

Footpaths

The stile across from the Butcher's Lane playing field is being looked at by the council and it is hoped that a better form of access will follow in due course.

Banbury Lane

At our October meeting Nigel Banister raised concerns regarding the speed and volume of traffic along the Banbury Lane. With extra vehicle movements from four residential developments along the Lane plus the industrial development at Millfield Business Park it is inevitable that traffic will increase. There were several residents from the parish at our last meeting raising concerns relating to The Millfield development, which the council has noted and will include in their response to Highways and West Northants Council. Nigel has compiled a list of areas of concern and possible ways to alleviate these problems but would welcome any input from parishioners.

DHL

The parish council's response to the updated DHL planning application on AL1 has been circulated to councillors and approved. It has been shared with the parish on the parish website and also highlighted on the Parish Council & Community FACEBOOK pages. The Clerk will submit our formal response to this application ahead of the (new) deadline of 17th December. Our thanks to David Keeble who has produced this response after spending many hours sifting through the acres of documentation.

Old Burial Ground

The council approved for work to be done at the site of The Old Burial Ground in Pattishall including the planting of some hedging, trimming and clearing areas that overgrown on boundaries and commemorative war graves.

Donation

The council is pleased to make a £150 donation to the Over Sixties Party to be held on Saturday December 3rd. Proceeds from the Bonfire Night, which was very well supported, will also go to making sure those attending have a really jolly time.

Finally, the Parish Council would like to wish you all a joyous festive season and a very happy New Year.

Budget and Precept 2023/2024

One of the biggest and most responsible jobs a PC has is to set the budget covering everything from grass cutting to street light electricity. This determines the precept paid by the members of the Parish through their

Council Tax. Being acutely aware of the pressures households face in the current climate the Council are very keen to maintain the current precept level if at all possible. This is a significant challenge with the rising costs we and our suppliers are facing and currently this is still a work in progress.

Councillor resignation

Mr Nigel Forster has recently resigned from the Council. Nigel was a great asset to our Council and we would like to wholeheartedly thank him for his contribution and enthusiasm especially the work he has done on the cemetery which had very poor records. Nigel diligently researched and recorded the graves as well as caring for the headstones. He was also our Police Liaison Officer. We will be advertising for a replacement in due course.

Cemetery/Church Yard Mowing

New plans for 2023/2024 contracts have been drawn up by Councillor Keith Hurford and discussed with the Church Warden to reduce the frequency of some of the cuts in the Church Yard while maintaining the frequency in the cemetery. It was also agreed at the last meeting to proceed with removal of the holly tree in the cemetery which is covering some headstones. Consideration was given to cutting back but cost wise, and with maintenance going forward this was deemed not a viable solution.

New Rules for Open Spaces.

New rules encouraging responsible dog ownership and banning smoking in specific public open spaces were approved by West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) coming into force on 1st November 2022 and lasting for three years.

This means dog owners could be fined $\pounds100$ if they fail to:

- pick up their dog's mess and dispose of it properly
- carry the means to pick up after their dog
- prevent their dog from entering public places from which dogs are excluded, including children's play areas, schools, skateparks, tennis courts, multi-use games areas (MUGAs) and bowling greens
- keep their dog on a lead when in cemeteries, burial sites, graveyards,

memorial gardens, allotments, car parks, sports grounds, fields and pitches - when in use for authorised sporting activity

• put their dog on a lead when asked to do so by an authorised officer

The order also restricts a person from walking more than four dogs at any one time and prohibits smoking in: children's play areas, schools, skateparks, tennis courts, multi-use games areas (MUGAs), and bowling greens.

Thanks to everyone who braved the cold and damp to pay their respects to people who gave their lives through war. We honoured 14 of those brave souls who made the ultimate sacrifice during WW1 and WW2. It was then back to the Parish Hall for soup and rolls kindly hosted by the Parish Hall Committee.



Vehicle Activated Speed (VAS) Signs CHPC are looking into the purchase of VAS cameras to attempt to tackle the constant speeding that occurs through the Parish. This has been a longstanding frustration for Parish members. This will allow better liaising with the Police as if it shows high levels of speeding the police speed van will be out more frequently. Councillors are meeting with a road safety officer from Keir Friday 11th November to assess sites.

Telephone boxes in the Parish

A suggestion from residents has been to renovate the phone box in Grimscote which the Parish Council fully support. Ideas are always welcome as to what to do with the phone boxes and we would be delighted to hear of creative suggestions to make our phone boxes into a nice village feature.

DHL Warehouse update.

This summary is from the Save Towcester Now Facebook post from 4th November '22.

DHL has submitted its revised planning application which is now under consideration. There is a SPC meeting scheduled for the 12th December and again for January 25th. Objections to the proposal can be made in writing to WNC. To object, go to <u>https://</u> <u>snc.planning-register.co.uk/Planning/Display/</u> <u>WNS/2021/1819/EIA</u> and click on comment on this application. The official deadline for objections is now 17th December.

Save Towcester Now have gone through the new Supplementary Planning Document (SPD) and the DHL application and will be making further objections on the following criteria, none of which meet the requirements of the SPD. Building heights/visual impact, traffic assessment, employment, environment, and heritage are all discussed in the Facebook article as either exhibiting lack of evidence or contravening the SPD.

Improving Towcester

Towcester Town Council has voted Option A of National Highways proposals for improving Towcester town centre. This includes removing car parking spaces from the Market Square, apart from spaces for the disabled. Removing parked cars will mean that the Market Square area will return to the heart of Towcester. Public events can be held in safety and overall, pedestrians will be able to eniov the town centre once more, bringing more trade to the town. The Town Mayor, Cllr Martin Johns, commented, "National Highways has listened to what Towcester residents have asked for and set out realistic plans to meet expectations. National Highways proposals for keeping HGVs out of our town centre and diverting them onto the A5/A43 link road will do just that. All the key elements: a 20mph speed limit, a 7.5 tonne weight limit, improved pavements, cycleways and more pedestrian crossings, are now on offer." Details still have to be worked through on these proposals and finally agreed.
